

Adult education and lifelong learning in Estonia

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






General information

- Area: ~45,000 sq km
- Total population: ~1.3 million
- Ethnic composition: Estonians 70%
- Population density: 30 people per sq km





Who is an adult learner in Estonia?

- A part-time learner:
 - in formal education (basic and general)
 - in work-related courses
 - in popular adult education courses (hobby groups etc)
 - Age is not important. This is not the learner's main activity. According to statistics it is the 25 64 age group.



Participation in lifelong education

Percentage of the population aged 25-64 participating in adult education and training is calculated during the period of four weeks prior the survey (Eurostat).

Participation rates over the past few years:

2008 - 9,8%

2009 - 10,0%

2010 - 10,9%

2011 – 12,0%



Adults in formal education

- General education (basic and secondary)
 17 evening schools + 18 schools with adult departements
- Vocational education full- and part-time studies

Access: people with basic education or aged over 17 State commissioned places



Adults in formal education II

 Higher education – students can choose between full-time and part-time studies

Access: everybody who has acquired secondary education. 45% state commissioned; 55 self-financed (full-time and part-time together)

Over 90% of the part-time studies are self-financed



Adults in non-formal education

- Work-related training:
 - vocational educational training institutions
 - higher education institutions
 - popular adult education centres
- Popular adult education
 - partly financed by the state

Access: for everyone



Promotion of adult education

- System of recognition of prior studies and work experience
- Adult education Act (1993)
- A new draft act is currently in process all different stakeholders are involved in the discussions (learners, providers, policy-makers etc)
